### Investment Firm Gets Emerson Site On \$22,825 Bid

A full block of modern business buildings, with off-the-street parking accommodations for all of the shops, will be erected on the south side of Colorado Street between Vinedo Avenue and San Gabriel Boulevard.

This was revealed by Harrison R. Baker yesterday when the Emerson Elementary School site was sold by the Board of Education to the Security Investment Company of Riverside. The investment company's bid of \$22,825 was the only one submitted, although the sale was open to oral bidding after the submission of written bids.

The sale price was \$225 more than the minimum price set by the Board of Education following an appraisal of the property at the time sale of the property was decided upon.

All buildings will be removed from the site by the Board of Education.

Mr. Baker, representing the purchasers, stated that the property not occupied by the modern shopping center, will be developed into residential lots.

The Emerson School will be moved to the Paloma Street School site near Fresh Hill Boulevard, where it will become the Paloma School.

## Boy, 14, Critically Hurt In Leap Over 'Gym Horse'

### Gordon Zahler, Sierra Madre, Lands On Head And Neck, Paralyzing Him Below Shoulders

When he apparently misjudged his distance and caught his foot on a gymnastion horse he was attempting to leap over, Gordon Zahler, 14, of 121 South Mountain Trail, Sierra Madre, was critically injured at the John Marshall Junior High School gymnasium yesterday.

The youth suffered a crushed vertebrae when he landed on his neck on the mat and was paralyzed from the shoulders down. After being X-rayed at St. Luke Hospital, he was taken to the General Hospital. Late yesterday his condition was held highly critical.

Ran Off Springboard  
The accident occurred while Harold S. Turner, class instructor, was giving members of the 10-1 physical education class an inspection for athletes' feet. After the instructor inspected a boy the student was free to do anything he desired until Mr. Turner finished with the others.

Gordon always was very active, according to Mr. Turner, and particularly liked to perform on the gymnastion horse. Students who saw the accident said Gordon ran off a springboard and started to leap over the horse, as he had done many times in the past.

Caught In Handle  
His foot caught in one of the handle's and Gordon landed on his head and neck on the mat the other side of the horse.

The Emergency Hospital ambulance was summoned and took the injured youth to St. Luke.

## Property Back On City Roll

### \$100,000 Worth May Be Redeemed Under Emergency Law

### 3-Month Opportunity Given Owners

Prospects of getting another \$100,000 worth of tax-delinquent property back on the city tax rolls bright with the adoption of the Board of City Directors today of an emergency tax relief ordinance.

Three-Month Opportunity  
Under this new law, property owners whose holdings were added to the city prior to the ordinance will be given a three-month opportunity to regain possession without payment of interest penalties.

From Nov. 15 to Jan. 15 property may be redeemed by payment of back taxes, interest and the advertising cost.

City Land Agent Harold M. Huls told City Directors yesterday one owner of 450 tax-delinquent lots would redeem them under the plan. He estimated that a total of \$100,000 or more in property would get back into the production by reason of the new ordinance.

Actually Benefits All  
City directors hesitated to pass the ordinance immediately because of the ground it was a little too lenient to persons who pay their taxes late and sometimes are too busy to pay a penalty merely for being late.

Tax Collector Sam F. Chas. said other cities had taken means of getting property back on the tax rolls and that the ordinance actually would benefit the community as a whole.

## May Broaden Food Stamp Program

Residents of Los Angeles in the low-income bracket soon benefit from the federal plus food stamp program, Mayor Gordon L. McDonough yesterday upon his return from a Washington conference with relief and Department of Agriculture officials.

The only remaining barrier to the inauguration of the food stamp program for the low-income is this county's acceptance of the task of administering the program and investigating the eligible applicants, Mr. McDonough said. Adoption of the program will enable families with income less than that of relief to share in the food stamps limited to gross actual earnings.

In Washington, Mr. McDonough consulted Phillip F. McGuire, assistant administrator of the federal surplus commodities corporation, other United States Department of Agriculture authorities regarding broadening of the food stamp program here.

Extension of the food stamp privilege to low-income families has already been inaugurated as an experimental basis in Shasta County.
